Making Amends to Lighten the Burden

Growing up I was always a "bigmouth" - the class clown. I talked too much in school and I usually had something to say that I thought was the funniest thing in the world. I tried, but I just wasn't able to maintain self-control.

A couple of weeks before report cards are issued, the school system notifies a student's parents of their child's ongoing progress. In ninth grade, I had a Spanish teacher who called these progress reports "Valentines." Every six weeks he would distribute them and his name would be written at the bottom, including his middle initial - Q.

This teacher was, by all standards of 1964, very effeminate. On this particular day, he passed out the "Valentines" as usual and someone asked him what the Q stood for. My seat was in the very middle chair in the very middle row and I spoke in what I believed was an extreme whisper and responded to the question with the word "QUEER!"

The world stopped at that instant. There was no laughing or talking - the room was quiet. The teacher bellowed, "Who said that?" The silence in the classroom was deafening and I was mortified! My favorite teacher had heard my insult and I couldn't say a word.

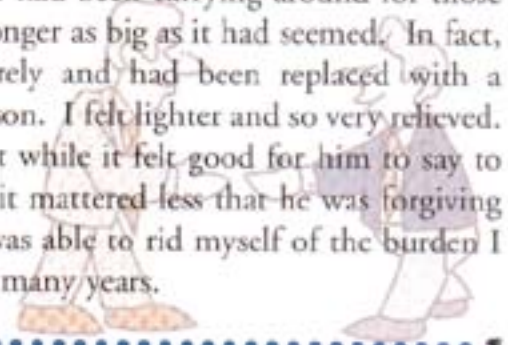
In the weeks to come, things were fine inside the classroom, but on a particular day when teachers were in school and students were not, I went to visit him and to ask him to translate some word I had heard. He looked at me for a moment and said, "You want ME to do something for YOU?" At that moment, I was

completely and painfully aware that he knew I had been the one who had insulted him weeks before.

I couldn't leave the room quickly enough. The school year crawled by; I got my A in class; life went on. I never forgot what I had said and I later realized how truly insulting it had been and how disappointed he must have felt. I went on to become a teacher myself and I did not know what had become of him. I finally met him in a school where I was visiting someone and he was a substitute teacher for the day. He was cordial as we said hello, but I could feel my face flush with the old embarrassment and the burden of what I had done was even larger.

A few years after that, I ran into him in a restaurant. By then I had gotten into recovery and was working my steps. As soon as I saw him, I knew what I needed to do. I asked him for a minute of his time and I reminded him that I had been in his class when I was about 13 years old. I shared with him that I was in a twelve-step program and part of my recovery includes making amends to those I have harmed along the way. I touched on the incident and told him how very sorry I was if I had caused him any pain or embarrassment when it happened or afterward. When I finished, he looked at me and smiled and said, "It's okay. You were just being thirteen."

I thanked him and we parted. Suddenly, I realized that the huge burden I had been carrying around for those 30 years was no longer as big as it had seemed. In fact, it was gone entirely and had been replaced with a memory and a lesson. I felt lighter and so very relieved. I also realized that while it felt good for him to say to me what he said, it mattered less that he was forgiving and more that I was able to rid myself of the burden I had carried for so many years.

It's hard to believe that almost three months have passed since the World Service Convention in Portland, but it must be true because we here at the Office are very busy preparing for this year's World Service Conference. Many thanks to all who attended this year's Convention, and a special thanks to the Host Committee. Portland is a beautiful city, and the weather cooperated more than we dared hope - there was lots of sunshine. We enjoyed great speaker meetings, fun events, lots of fellowship and so much more. Members of both the Office Board and the Board of Trustees also met at length to do the business of Cocaine Anonymous World Services. And in addition to all this, the Convention also raised approximately \$35,000. Even if you weren't able to join us in Portland this year, it's not too early to begin making plans for CAWS 2003 in the Windy City of Chicago. You should be seeing registration forms at meetings, and we are also already receiving registrations online. Visit the link on the CA web site for more information.

While the annual CAWS Convention is still the primary fundraiser for World Services, we are working toward a goal of subsisting more on Seventh Tradition donations and sales of chips and literature. If your District or Area has any H&I funds in reserve, now would be a good opportunity to forward those funds to help with the H&I video project. The Office has already received \$2,900 in donations dedicated to this project, and we have been promised an additional \$2,200. Any group or individual may send funds to the WSO and request that they be designated for this video project, and we hope that those who can will do so.

This video project is only one of the many items on the agenda for this year's Conference, which will be held in Los Angeles on August 27 - 31. For those of you who have never been to a World Service Conference and are wondering what the heck goes on there, we can refer you to Article Three of the Conference Charter: "The Conference will act for CA in the perpetuation and guidance of its world services, and it will also be the vehicle by which the CA movement can express its view on all matters of vital CA policy and all hazardous deviation from CA Tradition." But probably most of us who have been to previous Conferences would agree that the experience defies description. It's always a lot of work in a very short period of time, and it's also amazing to see the group conscience of CA working at this level. Any member of CA may attend (though only delegates may vote) and we encourage any of you who can to do so. We'll report the highlights of this year's Conference in our next issue.

Prestige

In the spirit of the Traditions and the direction of the Concepts of World Service, it appears that many of us, as trusted servants, may want to examine our adherence to the intent of our founders of being directly responsible to those they serve. In my travels over the past two years as a Trustee I have uncovered a discouraging, but not surprising, discovery of property and prestige issues amongst many of our trusted servants. Through our implied definitions of what our responsibilities are to this Fellowship and the implied direction of the Traditions and/or Concepts, I fear that many trusted servants have manipulated these definitions and directions into some sort of warped manifesto of discrete leadership intent.

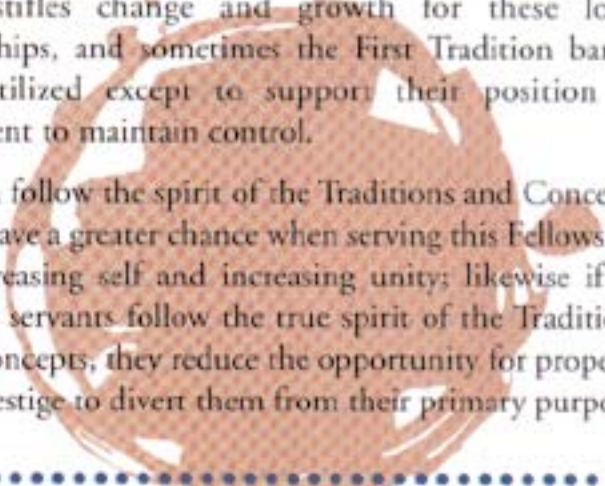
I believe the Traditions dictate that our fellowship needs as little organization as possible except on matters that may affect the CA fellowship as a whole. I also believe that our primary purpose should never be superseded by our ambitious need to expand our service structure beyond the immediate needs of the membership. In light of the financial deficits now facing our Fellowship, should we be using our simple committees as a financial means to fulfill or finance personal recognition or promote needs outside the scope of these committees? Is it appropriate that committees and/or subcommittees such as H&I and PI that maintain budgets larger than the Area budgets, which only serve the people who create these often misused or misdirected committees? I think not! I have discovered financial structures within structures of Areas and Districts that are disproportionate to our service design. Many (though not all) of our area and district structures are focused on either financing local ventures under the guise of the need to better serve CA as a whole (e.g., travel expense for officers and alternates, special projects, workshops, etc.). As an individual contributing to the Fellowship, whether through the Seventh Tradition or specific

fundraising events such as conventions, dances, and the like, it is reasonable to expect that these contributions be utilized in the most prudent way at the local committee level or be filtered down from the group level directly to the World Service Office.

What ever happened to the "good old days" when to serve this fellowship was to not cause hardship to it? In my early days as a delegate (1986) to the World Service Conference, when our Areas were new, without large budgets, we could not afford to send a delegate, let alone two or three alternates, advisors, or observers. We would alternate who would go, share manuals and materials, share rooms, pay our own airfare, etc. We did this willingly, always believing that what we did was necessary and for the greater good of the CA Fellowship. For this reason, Areas, Districts and committees should not hold on to money, because this will eventually justify a self-serving need to spend it. This will result in not only an under-funded World Service Office but will eventually destroy our Fellowship as a whole.

The Ninth Tradition suggests we not be organized and yet in many cases we often neglect to seek out advice from those that have gone before us, those that were often responsible for the creation of our local service structures. Old-timers are often called "bleeding deacons" and are often criticized and avoided instead of being sought and consulted for their invaluable experience. On the opposite end of the spectrum are our so-called "elder statesmen" who are often perceived to have power and/or influence. Through the development of "down line" representation (i.e., sponsees) at the District or Area level, these elders maintain their influence, which may be so permanently established at the district or area level that newcomers often surrender. This stifles change and growth for these local fellowships, and sometimes the First Tradition barely gets utilized except to support their position or argument to maintain control.

If I can follow the spirit of the Traditions and Concepts I will have a greater chance when serving this Fellowship of decreasing self and increasing unity; likewise if all trusted servants follow the true spirit of the Traditions and Concepts, they reduce the opportunity for property and prestige to divert them from their primary purpose.



PUBLIC INFORMATION

EXPERIENCE, STRENGTH & HOPE

I have had an amazing experience working with the Public Information Committee for the Phoenix district. I was asked to get the CA Public Service Announcement (PSA) aired on television stations in the metro Phoenix area. I started calling the station's community programming directors and connected with one that was given to me by another member. My contact at the studios had the PSA on the air within a week. I was amazed. A volunteer from the Helpline called me and shared with me a message from a woman who had lost her husband to crack and didn't know that CA existed until she saw the PSA. She wanted to thank us for helping others and wanted to know if there was any help available to people like her that didn't use but were affected by an addict. She was referred to another 12-Step Fellowship that deals with people affected by addicts in their lives. I called my contact at the station to thank him and was told that if there was positive feedback from the community that they would continue to air our PSA. I sent an e-mail to sixteen friends in the fellowship asking that they call the station and express their gratitude. Being the addict I am, thinking that more is better, I also urged them to request their groups call the station. I received a call the next day from my contact at the television station and he wasn't happy. He asked me if I had my friends calling the station. I told him that I had requested that the fellowships call the station to express their gratitude for the airing of our solution for addiction and he got angrier. He informed me that normally he would just pull the

spot because he is required to answer to the FCC regarding response to Public Service Announcements and the switchboard staff was not happy about being deluged with calls. He also had some trouble when checking to ensure that our local Helpline that appears in the PSA was working. I assured my contact that I would ask the fellowship to stop calling and look into the Helpline concerns. Before I went to the station to pick up a few tapes that they dubbed for the other local channels. I prayed for the strength to humble myself and make the situation right. I sent a follow up e-mail asking the fellowship to stop calling the station and felt a letter of amends would be appropriate. I took with me a letter of apology for any inconvenience my own will had created, gratitude to the station for allowing us to carry our message to the addict that still suffers and an explanation regarding the concerns they had expressed about the Helpline. After reading the letter there was a complete change in the demeanor of my contact there. He approached me to shake my hand and held it in both of his and thanked us for the work that we do. He then said that they would continue to air the CA PSA through the rest of this quarter. I didn't ask specifically when the quarter ends or at what time of day it would be aired because I was being rocketed into the 4th dimension at the time and felt nothing but tingles and love. I had a trust in my higher power that nothing more needed to be revealed than that which I was feeling. It was that old high again using nothing more than the 12 Steps. I walked out of the studios with joyful tears in my eyes and openly cried right there in the street and all the way to work

I cried, and there are tears in my eyes now as I reflect on it

WOW!!! Working with the Public Information Committee gives me the hope that I need to stay clean and sober another day. It is working the 12th step on a scale that is so large that sometimes it is immeasurable. We rarely know the people our service work has touched, but somehow the anonymity of it is a blessing of humility that is required for this addict/alcoholic to stay clean and sober another day.

What was it like to be new? There were times when I walked into a meeting and knew nearly everyone and felt welcome. The one C.A. meeting in my part of the county was one of those. I also remember a very large meeting at which after the meeting I made some attempts to join some of the small groups that met outside the meeting. It was hard for me to break into any of the conversations. I did not know these people and I sometimes left there with a feeling of rejection.

I am not perfect at welcoming the newcomer today, but I do make repeated attempts to talk to newcomers during the breaks and after the meetings. When they stand up as newcomers, I make an effort to remember their names. Many seem surprised when I approach them and call them by name.

I invite newcomers to coffee when we go and offer to treat occasionally if I am able, especial if they cannot afford it.

For those that cannot afford to attend our events, our Area has methods we use to cover the costs for newcomers to participate. I have seen other members help. Newcomers feel welcome and it is this type of action that helps our fellowship grow.

I am hoping that this sparks a fire in you to reach out. A hug, a cup of coffee, a ticket to a dance have, all helped me. It is easy to pass on.

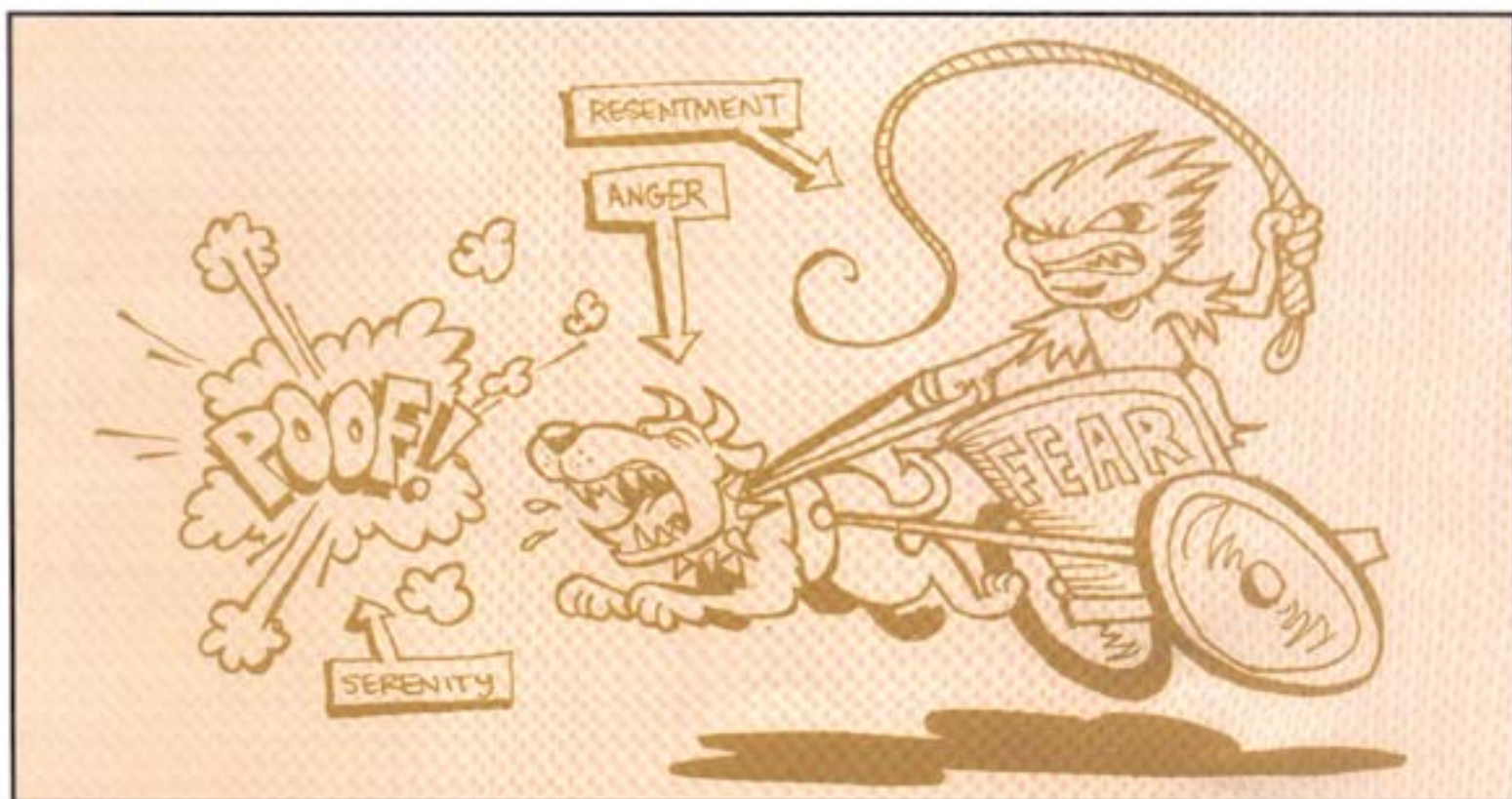
